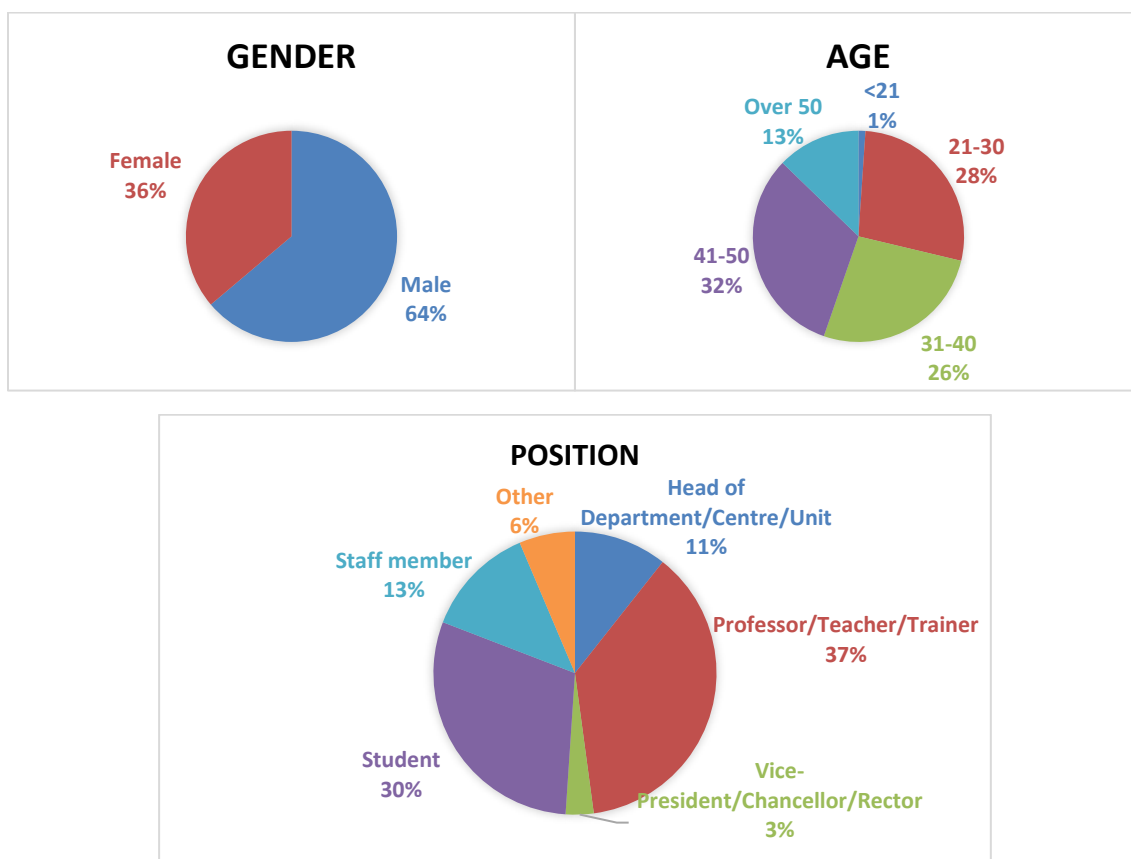

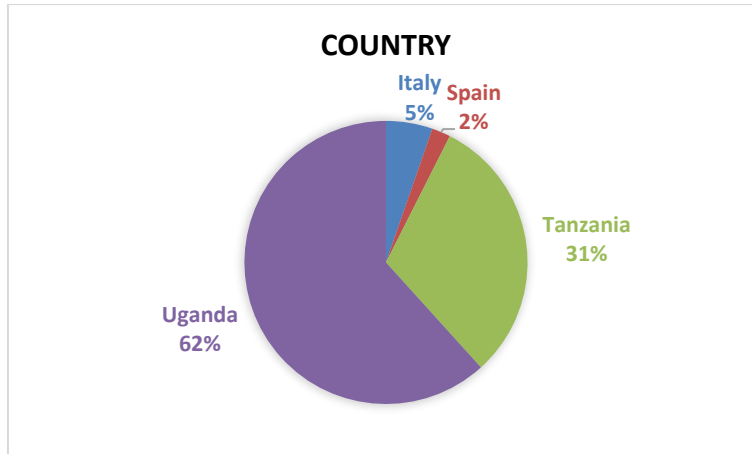

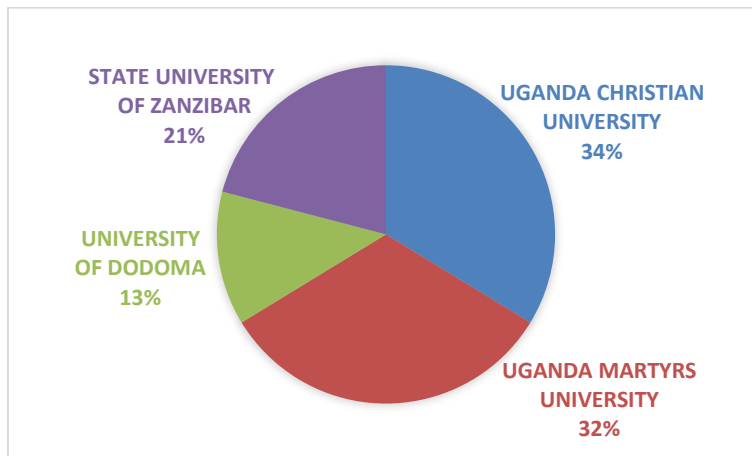
Below is provided an overview of the statistics of the people that registered (94) as well as of those who attended the event (59 people, 63% rate of participation).

Registered people:

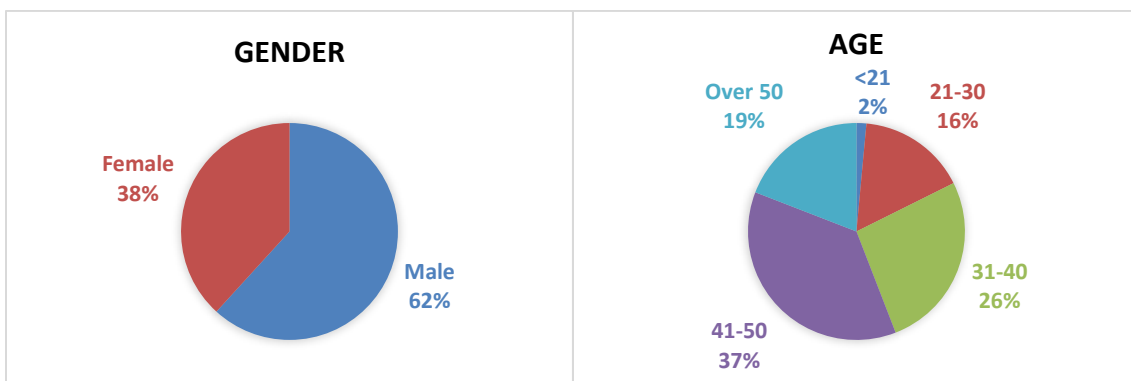


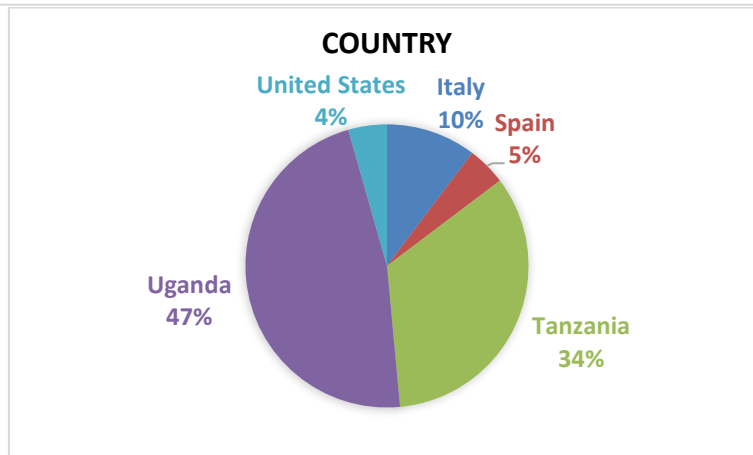
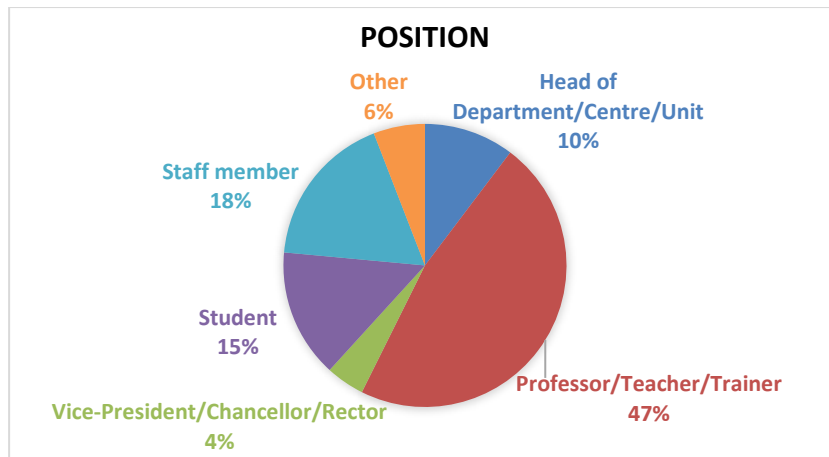


The Ugandan (Martyrs and Christian University) and Tanzanian (State University of Zanzibar and University of Dodoma) Institutions registered to the event as outlined below:

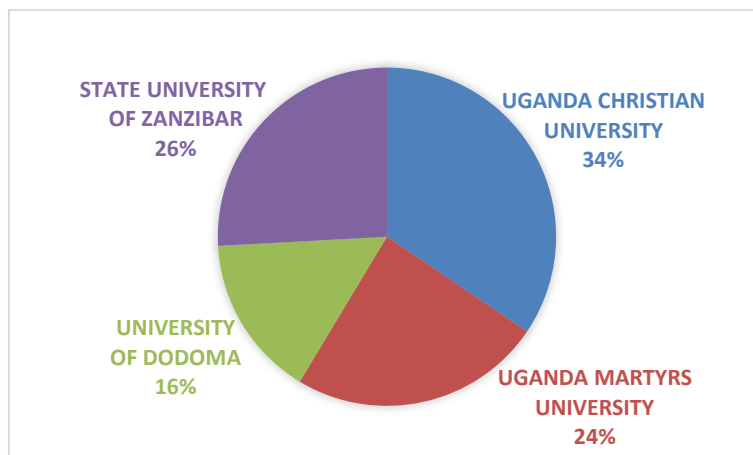

Due to the current Covid-19 pandemic, this event was an online webinar where all Partner Universities' Rectors, Vice-Chancellors, and other representatives presented their Institutions and highlighted the importance of a transversal collaboration at an academic level to tackle the complexity of the African green energy and renewable energy sector.

Sapienza University of Rome

Graziella Gaglione – Head of Non-EU Mobility and International Education Agreements Unit

The international office at Sapienza University of Rome deals with activities carried out in Europe and beyond: the Institution participates in a wide range of international projects addressing didactics, research, and cooperation with the aim to promote students and staff mobility around the world, also welcoming foreign scholars as visiting professors for research and teaching.

The development cooperation unit promotes international aid development programs and partnerships, participating in international and European funding programs, such as Europeaid and Erasmus Mundus ACP project, funded by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

Martina Vizzani – Non-EU Mobility and International Education Agreements Unit

Bilateral Agreements for Student Exchange is an understanding between Sapienza University of Rome and a non-EU institution aimed at exchanging Bachelor, Master and PhD students for study and/or thesis research (from a minimum of 90 days to a maximum of two consecutive semesters).

Prof. Marcella Corsi – Coordinator of Minerva Lab

Minerva Lab is a laboratory on Diversity and Gender Inequality that carries out multidisciplinary research activities, promoting the contamination between different research fields. It promotes various international projects (in Uzbekistan, India, Brazil, Tanzania and Uganda, Argentina, etc.), where the topics of major interest concern labour market discrimination, intersectionality, care economy, women and power, gender statistics.

University of Cadiz

Prof. Rafael Jimenez – Vice-Rector of International Affairs

The University of Cadiz is the closest European university to Africa. This proximity is seen as an opportunity to raise the level of academia and meet the challenges of current times. They are especially interested in promoting cooperation and international mobility of students and staff between Spain and Africa, offering different programs supported by non-EU mobility, Master and PhD programs. Currently, cooperation and mobility arrangements are active in Ivory Coast.

In January 2022 a Staff Week event will be organized by the University of Cadiz to promote new international agreements for the advancement in cooperation and mobility, and for the sustainable development of high education institutions. As part of the New Mobility Agreement, they want to promote staff and student mobility between Africa and Europe, as well as doctoral theses in different research projects.

State University of Zanzibar

State University of Zanzibar is open to collaborate with DALILA partners on various topics in the green sector, share experiences, and built academic capacity. 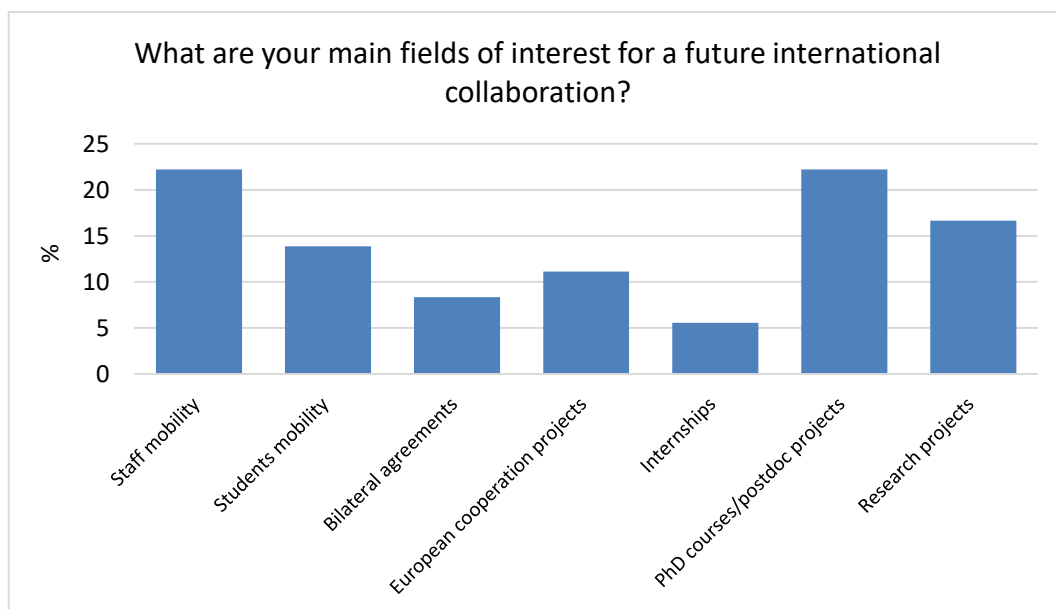
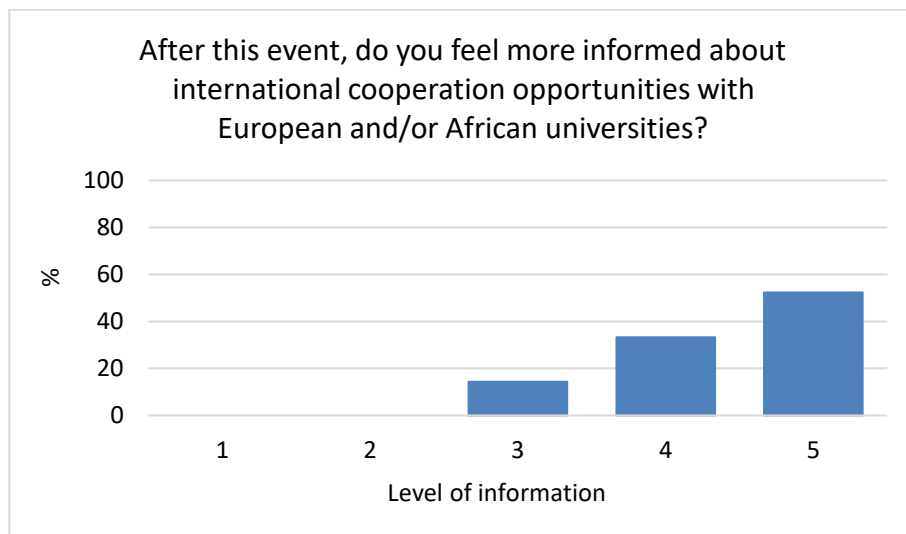
Uganda Christian University
